


Michael Morpurgo was born in St. Albans in Hertfordshire in 1943.

Michael did not like boarding school very much and his time there inspired part of his book The Butterfly Lion.




MENNET MORPURED

While he was teaching, Michael used to make up his own stories and tell them to his class. He didn't like the children's books available at the time!






Michael's headteacher asked him to write

Michael uses the recurring themes of 'triumph of an outsider', survival, and characters'

relationships with nature.

He sometimes uses the settings of Cornwall and World War I.





The aim of 'Farms for City Children' is to give city children an experience of the countryside. This project earned both Michael and his wife an MBE in 1999.





Five of Michael's books have been made into films. My Friend Walter (1988) and Out of the Ashes (2001) were both adapted for television.





Michael's book War Horse was adapted for the stage at the National Theatre in London in 2007.

From 2003 to 2005 Michael was the Children's Laureate. This rewards a lifetime contribution to children's literature and highlights the importance of children's books.



Michael was awarded an OBE in 2006.
